This is a system of agriculture, which also facilitates the promotion of the microbial life within the farming system by using the technology of Effective Microorganisms. The New Zealand Nature Farming Society has been the key organization promoting this method of farming and more importantly, the use of Effective Microorganisms, commonly termed EM, within New Zealand. The project was undertaken in the mid 1990s after the International Conference of IFOAM held at Lincoln University. The technology, which uses microbes from New Zealand, thus not importing any organism from overseas, has been adopted by many people, especially in the south island for increasing productivity of organic systems and also for overcoming problems of organic waste management. The technology also has the approval of Bio-Gro, New Zealand. Thus, the New Zealand

Nature Farming Society was the obvious choice to be called upon to organize this conference in Christchurch. This becomes a strategic aspect, to follow the IFOAM conference held 7 years ago, to inform farmers who adopted organic systems, a methodology that could enhance productivity to a greater extent while maintaining and more importantly improving the ecological balances of their farming systems.

The organizing committee has endeavored to develop a sound program to highlight the scientific basis of Kyusei Nature Farming and EM Technology, along with case studies from all over the world as well from New Zealand. Field trips have been organized to show the potential of Kyusei Nature Farming and the technology of Effective Microorganisms for agriculture and environmental management in the 21st century. Thus, it is with great pleasure that I welcome you to this conference to observe, learn, debate and possibly adopt the technology presented at this conference.

The participation in a conference does not mean education alone. New Zealand, and especially Christchurch and its environments offer many natural scenic sites that are exceptionally beautiful. As the field visits do not cover these aspects, I do request the overseas participants to visit these sites. It is something special. We Kiwis are a friendly lot and will help whenever possible.
